The Cicero resident's full-time job is with a Chicago-based not-for-profit organization called Center for Changing Lives. The group's mission statement, "is to partner with those held back by lack of resource and economic opportunity to uncover possibilities, overcome barriers and realize their potential."

Rodriguez serves as a Housing and Financial Coach. She does presentations in both English and Spanish to community groups or individuals interested in purchasing a home. She covers everything from money management to credit scores to mortgages to working with Realtors.

"It's a 12-hour course and we offer a lot of information," Rodriguez said.

Rodriguez is very proud of her involvement with "Today's Inspired Latina." She is one of 26 Latinas sharing their individual success stories in the book's third volume, which was released in May. Rodriguez is headed to New York in October on a book promotional tour.

Rodriguez and her mother are in their ninth year of their family-owned business, "Innovación Vida," which promotes individual personal development seminars serving the area's Hispanic community.

"Our business is growing," Rodriguez beams. "We've added a financial component to it and have an internet radio show called, "Entre Nosotras (Between Us Ladies) Radio" at 10 a.m. on Wednesdays." Rodriguez, who along with her mother came to the United States from Mexico in 2001, received two associate degrees from Morton College – the first in Arts in 2011 and the second in Business Management a year later. She started at National Louis University as an Elizabeth Harrison Fellows, but left to work as a program director at a homeless shelter/interim housing program in Pilsen.

"Going back to college is one of my goals," Rodriguez said. "I don't care if I'm 80 years old. I'll graduate for sure."

However, Rodriguez's two associate degrees from Morton College is something no one can take away. She maintains her education consisting of taking courses, plus attending seminars and workshops, equipped her with the latest information she needs for her jobs.
