Morton College offers financial aid, including grants, loans, and scholarships to all who apply and qualify. Our Financial Aid Office answers questions and distributes financial aid forms.

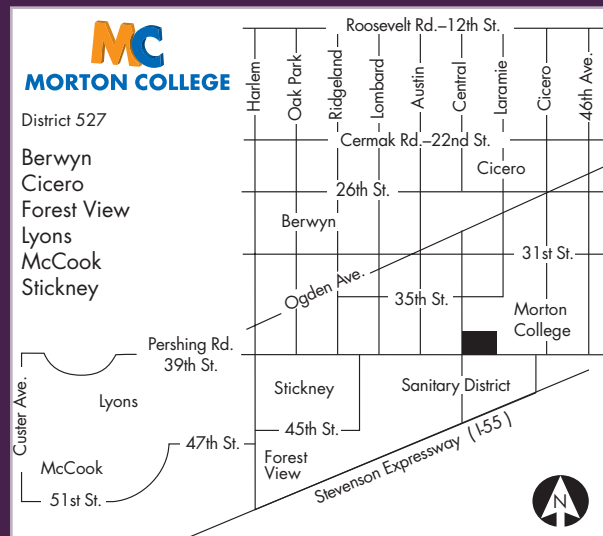

FOR THE MUSIC MAJOR

The TWO-YEAR Program

For the music major, the curriculum consists of two years of music study and general education. You study theory, history, harmony, ear training and sight singing as well as applied music and performance. You graduate with an associate degree and are qualified to transfer to a four-year college or university for a bachelor's degree.

FOR THE MUSIC APPRECIATOR

While you may choose any music course as a humanities/general education course, you may prefer to select from the popular courses on the next panel.



MUS 100 Music Appreciation

Covers music and composers from ancient to modern times with emphasis on Baroque, Classical and 20th Century. Demonstrates music as it has developed in Western Civilization.

MUS 101 History of Music: Pre-Twentieth Century

Surveys historical development of western music, including various musical styles, periods and contributions of key composers, conductors and performers shaping western musical traditions.

MUS 102 History of Music: Twentieth Century

Explores history, materials, composers and works from the 1890s to the present.

MUS 103 Music of Multicultural America

Traces select African, Asian, and European music from its origins through its continuing role in shaping a pluralistic American culture.

MUS 105 Introduction to American Music

Surveys American music of all types from colonial times to the present.

MUS 106 History of Jazz

Traces developments in jazz and analyzes various styles and forms, including swing, bop, cool and avant-garde jazz.

MUS 108 World Music Survey

Explores the music of Native and Afro-Americans, Africa, Japan, India, Indonesia, Latin America and Eastern Europe.

PRIVATE LESSONS

Instruction on any instrument, including guitar, piano, voice, percussion and woodwinds.

FOR PERFORMERS

Opportunities to sing and play - If you enjoy singing or playing an instrument in public, you may join, without an audition, a performance group below:

MUS 122 MC Singers

Performers sing a variety of vocal chamber music from all periods and styles.

MUS 123 Jazz Ensemble

Performers play a variety of jazz styles.

MUS 127 Community Chorus

Performers sing both major works and lighter concert music.

MUS 128 Community Orchestra

Performers play a variety of music, including choral-orchestral works with the Community Chorus.

MUS 129 Community Band

Members play a variety of music, including joint choral and band programs.
