What is Project CARE?

Project CARE is Morton College's volunteer adult literacy program. It uses trained volunteer tutors to teach adult students who want help with reading and writing, and/or adults who are learning English as a Second Language. Tutoring services are available to all eligible students, even if they have a high school diploma. And the best part is that these services are free.

Students can also use the Academic Skills Center's computer lab, which has educational software programs, to build a variety of skills. The lab can be used individually or with the help of a tutor.

How can I help?

There are fulfilling opportunities for all types of enthusiastic volunteers. These include tutoring that is...

- Individual, one-on-one
- Small group (two to ten students)
- In a classroom as an instructor aide

Volunteers receive a total of 12 hours of training in how to be a tutor. After completing the training sessions, volunteers are asked to provide three hours of tutoring per week for a minimum of 3 months.


