

Registration

Register early because late registration can cause a class to be canceled due to low enrollment. Decisions about cancellation are made three days to a week before the start date of the class.

Even if the class has already started, students can still register for them. However, the fee/s remain the same.

Fees

The cost of these courses varies from class to class, and are not related to the tuition and fee schedule for credit courses. In addition to the course fee, there may be a materials fee and/or a technology fee. These fees are listed with the course description and are subject to change.

Refund and Drop Procedures

It is the **student's** responsibility to make payment and/or drop a course. If students have not paid for the class by noon two business days after the first class session, they will be dropped from the class.

If the class is only one day, payment must be made before the class begins. Same-day registration is allowed, however, in that instance, a payment receipt may be requested by the instructor.

If students drop the class prior to the second class session, they will receive a 100% refund. Otherwise any refunds would need to be approved by the Dean. Classes canceled by the college are refunded in full.
